

Head Teacher's Message

We have enjoyed welcoming our new Year R children into Chestnut Class and have been so impressed at how settled they are already. Yesterday, they met Nala, my Cavapoo. Nala comes into school with me sometimes and the children adore seeing her. This inspired quite a lengthy chat with Chestnut Class about all their pets and different animals that they know of. They were really excited to find out that Nala is 4 years old, which is the same age that they are!

We have made some changes to the behaviours and rewards system this year and trialling a new system called 'Class Dojo'. This is instead of the peg boards. The children have been really excited for this change. See page 3.

As we begin this new academic year, I would like to share with you what my top 3 elements are to ensure your child has every opportunity for a successful year ahead.

- 1) Attendance children with attendance between 95–100% are most likely to achieve the milestones for their age.
- 2) Reading hearing your child read for 10 minutes every day can increase vocabulary, improve spellings and support routines at bedtime.
- 3) Communication parenting and teaching are two very tough jobs. Let's keep the communicating so that we work together in partnership, to support each other.

Classroom Rewards

Have you heard your children talking about their Dojo points this week?

We have decided to trial a new system this year and the children are loving it!

Class Dojo is an interactive platform visible to all pupils in their classroom on the interactive white-board. It allows any member of staff to award points to pupils for making responsible choices, good conduct, teamwork and helping others. Points can also be deducted for negative behaviours. The platform encourages a positive classroom culture, enabling the children to achieve individual rewards and house rewards. It is replacing the peg board system.

Dojo points will be awarded for positive interactions that may include:

Showing any of the 5 R's (ready, resourceful, resilient, reflective, responsible)

Portraying any of our 3 Christian values (Love, Hope & Courage)

Effort

Polite manners

Encouraging others

Being helpful

Being brave

Representing the school

Competitions

Attendance



All our children know that there are consequences to poor behaviour choices. Dojo points may be deducted for:

Not following the school rules Refusal to follow instructions Lack of effort in their learning Rudeness Physical violence

Children can instantly see how many Dojo points they have accumulated during the school day.

During Celebration Collective Worship on Friday, children will receive the following stickers, one to wear and one to put on their house team board in the hall.

Please take the time to read the important reminders below

- Please label everything with your child's name This includes coats, bags, hats, gloves etc we
 don't have the space in school to accommodate large volumes of un-named lost property. Lost
 property is emptied at the end of every term. Anything unnamed will be given to charity.
- **Top up school meal funds** Reminder that the price is increasing to £3.20 per meal effective from September.
- **Medication in School** Please ensure that any medication e.g Inhalers, epipens etc are brought to the school office in the first instance. The medicines will then be logged and stored appropriately. Any medication should be in its original packaging, clearly stating the child's name and an expiry date and an up to date asthma plan will be required to support inhalers in school.
- **Absence** If your child is absent from school at any time please ensure that you call the school office (02380 732289), leave a voicemail or send a parentmail before 8.50am. If we are not informed of a child's absence, we will continually ring every contact logged on Arbor, until we can establish a reason for the absence. Holiday requests must have a form completed prior to the absence (a supply of these are kept in the school reception).
- After School Clubs Please remember to book your child's place if they would like to attend an after school club. Some have proven very popular and are already fully booked apologies if your child has missed out this time around. We also have breakfast and after school club available.

Safeguarding your children

- **Parking** Our school is a no drive zone and parking within the school is not permitted if you are collecting your child, please park considerately. The community hall has a large car park you can park and walk from. There is one space in the layby for Blue Badge Holders. Please only park in this space if you have a blue badge on display.
- **Castle** Children are not allowed on the castle unless supervised by a member of staff. School will not be held responsible for any injury caused to a child if this rule is ignored.
- Bikes and Scooters Children are not allowed to cycle or scoot on the School grounds. School
 will not be held responsible for any injury caused to a child if this rule is ignored.
