

Head Teacher's Message

Dear Parents and Carers,

There has been a lot in the news recently about the changes made to Ofsted Inspections. So what does it all mean and how do school leaders and teachers in general feel about the changes?

In general, there is a definite air of disappointment. Ofsted has always brought a huge amount of extra pressure, stress and workload to the profession, particularly in the lead up to and throughout the inspection.

After Ruth Perry, an overhaul was promised but instead, the feeling is that the government has just rebranded it. The retention of teachers crisis is the worst I have ever known. Teachers train to teach children. That is their job and should be the only job they are expected to do. However, the job has grown into something that is unsustainable. The expectation on school staff to be able to teach, prevent and fix everything is unrealistic and too overwhelming. These are the key drivers out of this profession. I think it is important to mention here that the school day for staff in schools does not start at 8:50am and end at 3:25pm. Planning, preparation and assessment are all key aspects to a teachers role, and often completed as unpaid overtime in school or in their own time at home so until workload is addressed by Ofsted, as part of a proper over-haul, retention of teachers will not improve.

Although our next Ofsted inspection isn't due for a while, I will be following closely to see the difference this rebrand makes when inspections start again in November, I am usually an optimist but on this occasion, I doubt the cost was worth it. Wishing you all a wonderful weekend!

Please take the time to read the important reminders below

- Please label everything with your child's name This includes coats, bags, hats, gloves etc we
 don't have the space in school to accommodate large volumes of un-named lost property. Lost
 property is emptied at the end of every term. Anything unnamed will be given to charity.
- **Top up school meal funds** Reminder that the price is increasing to £3.20 per meal effective from September.
- **Medication in School** Please ensure that any medication e.g Inhalers, epipens etc are brought to the school office in the first instance. The medicines will then be logged and stored appropriately. Any medication should be in its original packaging, clearly stating the child's name and an expiry date and an up to date asthma plan will be required to support inhalers in school.
- **Absence** If your child is absent from school at any time please ensure that you call the school office (02380 732289), leave a voicemail or send a parentmail before 8.50am. If we are not informed of a child's absence, we will continually ring every contact logged on Arbor, until we can establish a reason for the absence. Holiday requests must have a form completed prior to the absence (a supply of these are kept in the school reception).
- After School Clubs Please remember to book your child's place if they would like to attend an after school club. Some have proven very popular and are already fully booked apologies if your child has missed out this time around. We also have breakfast and after school club available.

Safeguarding your children

- **Parking** Our school is a no drive zone and parking within the school is not permitted if you are collecting your child, please park considerately. The community hall has a large car park you can park and walk from. There is one space in the layby for Blue Badge Holders. Please only park in this space if you have a blue badge on display.
- **Castle** Children are not allowed on the castle unless supervised by a member of staff. School will not be held responsible for any injury caused to a child if this rule is ignored.
- Bikes and Scooters Children are not allowed to cycle or scoot on the School grounds. School
