

# **How to Write an Acrostic Poem What is an Acrostic?**

Acrostics are a fun poetic form that anyone can write. They have just a few simple rules, and this lesson will teach you how to create acrostic poems of your own.

To begin with, an acrostic is a poem in which the first letters of each line spell out a word or phrase. The word or phrase can be a name, a thing, or whatever you like. When children write acrostics, they will often use their own first name, or sometimes the first name of a friend.

Usually, the first letter of each line is capitalized. This makes it easier to see the word spelled out vertically down the page.

Acrostics are easy to write because they don't need to rhyme, and you don't need to worry about the rhythm of the lines. Each line can be as long or as short as you want it to be.

# Easter Themed Basket Craft


#### Instructions:

- 4. Fill your box with Easter goodies.










The following activities are great ways to get outside in the sunshine and have some fun as well as learning at the same time.

# 1. Leaf hunt

See how many different shades of green you can find in the leaves in your garden or outside your home. See if you can find one to match each colour of our shade chart. You can print the shade chart and, using a piece of tape, stick each leaf next to its matching colour then see how closely you matched them at the end. (Colour chart on next slide)

### 2. Nature collages

Go outside into your gardens or outside areas and gather together leaves, sticks, twigs, stones etc. and create pictures on the ground using it all. You could try and create pictures of animals, plants or just a pretty picture. There are some ideas below:







### 3. Nature mandalas

Use the resources outside to create a mandala on the ground. You could use leaves, sticks, different colours etc. There are some ideas below:







### 4. Scavenger hunt

Use the nature scavenger hunt sheet and see how many of the things you can spot when outside.



# 5. Leaf rubbings

#### **Directions:**

- 1. Put a leaf upside down on the table.
- 2. Place a piece of paper over the leaf.
- 3. While holding the paper and leaf in place, use the side of a crayon to rub across the leaf.
- 4. Make sure that you colour over the entire leaf. Rubbing firmly all over the leaf will show the veins and the outline of the leaf
- 5. A dark crayon will produce a clearer print of the leaf.

6. Do another leaf with different colour crayon.
